# Clubhouse Exterior Renovation in the Home Stretch

The last steps in the exterior renovation of the Lake Forest clubhouse are under way.

The directors of the Lake Forest Property Owners Association on Oct. 23 awarded a \$117,400 roofing contract to Ridgeline Construction, the same company that did the siding on the clubhouse earlier this year.



The flat surface of the clubhouse roof will be coated with 60-mil PVC

The work will include installing about 6,600 square feet of 60-mil PVC on the flat roof, about 1,900 square feet of GAF architectural shingles on the decorative wing, 6-inch gutters and 4-by-3-inch downspouts. Damaged structural components, such as the plywood decking, will be replaced as needed.

The re-roofing also will include an improved drainage management system on the surface and re-enforced walkways to the mechanical units.

"We've been a long time getting here, but we had to follow our process of getting three bids and then negotiating for the best price," says LFPOA President Mathew Laws.

"Ridgeline did outstanding work on the siding, and I'm certain we'll have the same application quality with the roofing."

Including the Hardie siding, painting, insulation, termite repairs and demolition and provided the roofing price holds -- the clubhouse renovation will come in about \$277,000, General Manager Jeff Arrant says."If the crew can get started in time and the weather holds, we ought to have everything completed before Christmas," says Arrant.

The POA was forced to renovate the building's exterior because the POA's insurer refused to provide property and casualty coverage on the building due to the poor condition of the cedar shake siding.



The decorative wing on the back of the building will have new architectural shingles.

The structure was built in 1975 to house the grill, pro shop and POA office as an extension to a larger clubhouse, which was later demolished because of a termite infestation.

"As best as we can determine based on our office records, that siding and the roof were original. There had been roof patches and recoating over the years but never a total replacement," Arrant says.

Once the exterior is completed, says Laws, the board president, the Infrastructure and Budget committees will begin looking at affordable changes to the interior that will increase capacity and improve kitchen functionality.

#### Roof (contd)

A key revenue source for the pro shop is tournament play, which typically involves a lunch or dinner for the golfers. If the interior renovations can increase seating capacity from about 85 to 120, the course can seek to attract larger tournaments.

"Once we get the roof finished and closed out, we'll look at what we have [\$150,000] in the five-year plan for the interior renovation and whether that will work," says Laws. "We may have to push that back to 2027 in the plan, depending on how we finish building our budget this year."

#### 17th Hole Renovation

An iconic hole on the Lake Forest golf course is being restored as part of some overall maintenance.

The classic 17th, a 164-yard, par 3, with an elevated tee and water-guarded green, is the hole you see on Bayview Drive on your right after you pass the northern entrance to Rolling Hills Drive.

For years, it had been the cover photo for Lake Forest promotional brochures and a favorite location for real estate agents to slow down and mention the 18-hole course.



Unfortunately, the pond in front of the green began losing water about a decade ago. A pool that had been 6 feet deep was now measured in inches.

"This was one of our priorities in our expanded golf course upgrade plan, but we had to solve the leakage problem before we could restore the pond," says Lake Forest General Manager Jeff Arrant.

Previous efforts, he explains, included an attempt in 2018 to use a pool liner, but the moment runoff got behind the liner, it slipped and all was lost.

"It was in danger of becoming a sand trap, but we wanted to make one more attempt because the pond makes driving the green more of a challenge. You can hit into a trap without a penalty, but you have to take a stroke if your shot lands in the water," Arrant says.

This time, the golf maintenance staff has made sure all leaks are sealed, that the disused city storm sewer is capped and packed on the outside. Next, the crew will use about 2,000 pounds of Bentonite clay to fortify the pond walls.

Mike George, who remembers when the pond was at full pool, is excited about the hole's renovation.

"This is the hole everybody knows us for," says Mike. "With the pond the way it was, it was kind of an eyesore. It'll be great to have our signature hole back looking the way it should."

The pond work is just one of the golf maintenance projects at the moment.

#### **Other Course Projects**


Another serious repair being examined is just below the tee box on the 10<sup>th</sup> fairway. A small washout that was exacerbated by the April storm has undermined the cart path. A broken storm sewer pipe is the primary cause of the trouble, because the pipe handles most of the water runoff from Penny Lane and part of a power line easement.

Board President Mathew Laws III, a retired civil engineer, says he and Arrant toured the site with a Daphne assistant engineer, who said it was not the city's responsibility to repair the broken pipe. Laws disputes the city's position.

As you drive through the neighborhood, you also will notice some tree removal on holes 1, 6, 8, 9, 10 and 17.

Some of the work involved removing dead trees. Much of it was aimed at reducing runoff and opening the greens and surrounding areas to sunlight so the areas could be planted with grass that would lessen erosion.

"We had to think long and hard about losing trees, but we had to do what was right, both to be in compliance with the city [about dirt flowing onto streets] and to protect the overall health of the golf course," GM Arrant says. "I think once residents see the result – when we have sodded, planted bedding and installed benches or picnic tables to help residents enjoy the views – everybody will appreciate the changes."

His family has lived in Lake Forest since May 2024. He joined them upon retirement last July.

#### **How to Run for the LFPOA Board**

Four seats on the seven-member LFPOA board will be up for election at the annual meeting on March 26.

Members may begin submitting candidacy declarations on Dec. 15. The deadline to apply is the end of the business day on Dec. 31.

You may obtain the necessary documents at the office, 1 Golf Terrace, in the building that contains the pro shop and the 19<sup>th</sup> Hole grill. Not all forms are online.

All documents must be submitted to the office.

#### To qualify, you must:

1. Be a member in good standing.

#### This means:

- Have paid all dues, fines and assessments.
- Not be under disciplinary action or architectural suspension.
- Not be involved in any legal action against the LFPOA or its board.
- 2. Maintain good standing throughout the election period.
- 3. Submit a signed candidate information form that includes:
  - Full name
  - Member number
  - Address and contact information
  - Qualifications (a brief work description or attached resume)
  - A signature verifying your good standing
  - A photo is requested
- 4. Sign and submit within three business days of filing as a candidate:
  - Code of Ethics
  - Rules of Conduct
  - Conflict-of-Interest Policy

Failure to submit these documents disqualifies you.

- 5. Submit a resume by Dec. 31.
- 6. Pass a background check by the Alabama Alcoholic Beverage Control Board


